The TTG Library is now taking bookings for the upcoming school holiday programs. Get your friends together and have some fun!



It's a Living Thing

In Junior Primary Science this term, we have been studying Biology, where students across the year levels have been exploring, investigating and discovering all about living and non-living things, life cycles, growth and change.

The Reception students explored what living things need to survive. They experimented with how plants use water, learning about capillary action. This is where the xylem and phloem capillaries draw up and transport the water around the plant. This was very exciting.







The Year One students got creative after investigating the different features of animals. They were tasked with designing a zoo that groups animals in different ways.



HB 14 learnt that Scientists look around and ask questions about the natural world. The class followed the scientific method by asking the question, "How much does a bean grow in 3 weeks?" They then made a hypothesis (a prediction) about what they thought the answer might be. The class then set off to do an experiment to see if they were right.

While the results are not yet official, I can tell you that a number of our students did exceptionally well. In the under 10's Selena Aravalo did well in the discus and Kayden Shields had a busy day, making the finals of both the 100m and 200m, winning the 100m.

April 2nd is World Autism Awareness Day. It's aim is to help spread a greater understanding and acceptance of autism and autistic people. Here at Golden Grove Primary School we celebrate neurodiversity. We are committed to growing our knowledge around autism and are excited to share this with our school community.

Autism is a lifelong developmental condition in which individuals experience difficulties with social and communication skills and display a variety of repetitive behaviours. One to two people in a hundred are diagnosed with autism.

Most recent research identified the most challenging school tasks for autistic children, which include:

- Planning for assignments
- Working as part of a group
- Handwriting
- Coping with change
- Copying with bullying teasing
- Staying calm when other kids annoyed them or classroom was busy

Neurodiversity within our classrooms can also bring a lot of joy and a range of different strengths. It is important to be objective when describing behaviours and not make judgements.
